Celebrating Inclusivity Through Art: World Unseen Photography Exhibition Opens at KNLS

From December 3rd to 8th, 2024, the Kenya National Library Service (KNLS), in partnership with Canon Central & North Africa and The Kenya Society for the Blind, proudly hosted the World Unseen Photography Exhibition at Maktaba Kuu, Sanaa Centre.

The exhibition, which coincided with the International Day for Persons with Disabilities on December 3rd, was a groundbreaking showcase of inclusivity, innovation, and the transformative power of technology. Visitors experienced tactile photographs enhanced with braille and audio descriptions, offering a multi-sensory experience that redefined how art can be appreciated by individuals with visual impairments.

The event was celebrated as a significant step toward making art universally accessible. Speaking during the launch, KNLS CEO Dr. Charles Nzivo remarked, "This exhibition demonstrates how creativity and technology can bridge gaps, ensuring that no one is left out of the artistic experience. It's a testament to our commitment to fostering inclusivity in all spaces."

Canon Central & North Africa, known for its innovative imaging solutions, emphasized its dedication to creating meaningful societal impact. Canon Regional Manager highlighted, "This exhibition is a celebration of diversity and the belief that art is a language everyone should experience."

The Kenya Society for the Blind also lauded the initiative, noting how partnerships like this help to amplify awareness about accessibility challenges while showcasing practical solutions.

The World Unseen Photography Exhibition drew diverse audiences, from art enthusiasts and students to individuals with disabilities, all of whom were inspired by the unique approach to showcasing photography. Visitors shared heartfelt feedback, with many describing it as a transformative and thought-provoking experience that deepened their understanding of accessibility and inclusion.

As the exhibition closed on December 8th, it left behind an enduring legacy of the power of collaboration and innovation in building a more inclusive world.



Former U.S. Ambassador Meg Whitman Launches American Corner Mtaani at KNLS
